DECRETUM ERECTIONIS PAROECIAE AMOVIBILIS SUB TITULO SANCTI
THOMAE APOSTOLI, APUD BLOOMFIELD, STATUS NEO CAESAREAE

We hereby on this 26th day of January, A. D. 1939, in accordance with and observance of Canons 454, 1427 and 1428, Praeauditis Consultoribus Concilii Nostri Archdiocesanis, constitute and erect in the Brookdale Section of the City of Bloomfield in the County of Essex, and State of New Jersey, a new separate and distinct parish, Paroecia Amovibilis, to be dedicated under the title of St. Thomas the Apostle, and which is described, defined and bounded as follows:

BEGINNING on the northwest of the Junction of the Montclair-Bloomfield line with the Passaic-Essex County Line, east along, the Passaic-Essex County Line and the south side of Kingsland Road to Bloomfield Avenue, Nutley; south along the west side of Bloomfield Avenue, Nutley, to Hoover Avenue, west along the north side of Hoover Avenue Bay Avenue to Walnut Crescent; north along the east side of Walnut Crescent to Oxford Street, thence north along the Montclair line to point of beginning at Passaic Essex County line near Broad Street.

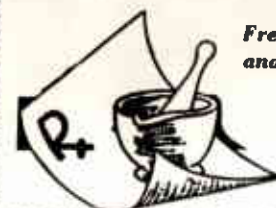

A LENTEN MESSAGE

Our worth as a human being, as a member of society, as a member of an organization, and as a Catholic can be measured only by the amount of progress we make personally. For no matter what our occupation may be, if it does not lead us closer to God and the realization of our dependency on Him, it is of no value to us.

Thus we have the season of Lent. It is a time when we thank God for what He has done for us, but it should also make us ask ourselves, "What are we doing for God?" Take for example our great gift of speech. We use it to express our love for God and neighbor and it is something beautiful and good. Yet, what is the value of that gift if we use it to curse and damn other objects of creation. On the feast of St. Blaise we had our throats blessed to protect us from all evils of the throat, physical and moral. How many times do we

use that throat to make our bodies the tabernacle of the Holy Trinity through Holy Communion and use that same part of our bodies to spit back vulgarity and indecency to contaminate the world. Where is the value of such an act.

Thus, during this Lent, we should personally try to improve our own language and try to give good example to others with whom we work and associate. In this little way we can show Christ that we appreciate His death on the cross. Yet in doing this we will become a better citizen of the United States, a better member of this great Catholic Church and a more perfect Christian in every sense of the word. Cement such Lenten resolutions by attendance at Mass and Communion even daily; Novena each Monday (Sermon by Fr. Sokolich); Stations of the Cross on Fridays and "Sunday Special"—Rosary and Benediction at 3 P. M.

An Historical Note on our Parish as we await the DEDICATION of the NEW CHURCH !

The Parish of St. Thomas in the Brookdale Section of the Town of Bloomfield was canonically erected on the 26th day of January, 1939.

The name was especially selected by the Most Rev. Thomas Joseph Walsh, S.T.D., J.C.D., Archbishop of Newark, who also selected a plot of ground consisting of 5½ acres on Byrd Avenue and Day Street. The Most Rev. Archbishop also approved a sketch of a combination Church and School building submitted by Anthony J. De Pace, Architect of New York City. On June 17th, 1939 the Rev. Thomas J. Herron was appointed the first Pastor of the newly created Parish.

On Sunday, June 25th, 1939 the first Mass in the Parish was celebrated by Father Herron. A tent 60 x 100 ft. and seating 900 people had been erected and was to be used as a temporary structure until the basement of the contemplated building was ready.

On August 1st, 1939 the contracts for the new Church and School building were awarded.

On Sunday, August 6th, the ground was blessed and the first spadeful of earth was taken out by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. T. M. Donovan, the Revs. James J. Owens, Thomas J. Herron, James F. Flanagan, Charles Murphy, Edward Stanley, Eugene McGuire, B. Socha, Donatus Walsh, O.F.M. and Firman, O.F.M. The blessing was followed by Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament. At the blessing Msgr. Donovan promised \$30,000. to the new Church, which promise was later fulfilled.

Plans for a new Rectory designed also by Mr. Anthony J. DePace were submitted to the Chancery, and approved by his Excellency and the Archdiocesan Building and Sites Committee. The contracts for this additional unit were signed on September 15, 1939, said work to be completed in four months.

Work on the Church and School building was pushed rapidly and on Oct. 15th, 1939 the cornerstone of the building was placed in position by His Excellency the Most Rev. Thomas Joseph Walsh, S.T.D., J.C.D., assisted by the Rt. Rev. Msgrs. Paul T. Carew and T. M. Donovan, the Rev. Fathers Thomas J. Herron, James J. Owens, Thomas A. Boland, James F. Flanagan, James A. Hughes, N. A. Marnell, Thomas K. Burke, Thomas Kenny, William J. Landers and Charles Murphy. Rev. Matthew J. Toohy delivered the principal address, followed by the Most Rev. Thomas Joseph Walsh, S.T.D., J.C.D. and the Rev. Thomas J. Herron.

This date, October 15th, also marked the first service in the new building and the abandoning of the tent, which was then taken down. Mass was celebrated for the first time that morning in the basement of the new structure. Although this was only partly finished, it served as a church until December 24th when Mass was celebrated in the Church Auditorium. After four weeks, services were again resumed in the basement, now practically completed, and continued until the Church was dedicated March 31st, 1940.

U. S. Negroes Hail Naming Of New African Cardinal

An official of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People has hailed the action of Pope John XXIII in naming the Church's first Negro cardinal.

The elevation to the cardinalate of Bishop Laurian Rugambwa of Rutabo, Tanganyika, "gives American Negroes a deep sense of pride and an abiding feeling of encouragement," Dr. Channing H. Tobias said in a cablegram to the Pope.

Dr. Tobias is chairman emeritus of the NAACP board of directors. He is a former member of the U.S. delegation to the United Nations General Assembly. In 1951 he was received in audience at the Vatican by Pope Pius XII.

Meanwhile, other leaders in the interracial movement praised Bishop Rugambwa's appointment as an "act of wisdom and statemanship," and "a striking demonstration of Church initiative and leadership."

In his message to Pope John, Dr. Tobias added: "Our good wishes to you and our commendations to the new Cardinal and his colleagues, including the first Japanese and Filipino descent."

Bishop Rugambwa, 47, is a native of Tanganyika, a United Nations trust territory scheduled to become self-governing next year. He speaks Kihaya, a Bantu language, as his native tongue, as well as Swahili, English and Italian.
